Is there a documented quality assurance plan designating an individual to take responsibility for quality assurance, including assessment of the performance of trainers / assessors at least annually?	Yes		Our business is committed to continuous improvement and has a robust Quality Assurance Plan for training which sits within our Quality Management Framework. We hold accreditation from the following bodies: NQA - ISO9001:2008 Edexcel - BTEC level3/4 for PTLLS SFAT were previously accredited by HSE. Since their withdrawal from overseeing training companies in October 2013 we have been accredited by: The First Aid Industry Body (FAIB) — who monitor us in the same way that HSE monitored us prior to Oct 2013 ie FAIB carry out all due diligence checks on training companies and ensure they are in place before they are accredited. Scottish Qualifications Authority (SQA) — we deliver all regulated first aid credentials in Scotland through SQA and are audited by them annually. ITC — we deliver all regulated first aid credentials in England through ITC and are audited by them annually.



		Our company guarantees that our workplace first aid training credentials are monitored by a recognised external body. This ensures that standards sit at the highest level.
		Our Quality Management Framework is overseen by our Quality Director. This person is responsible for ensuring that each area of the framework is monitored on an ongoing basis using highly qualified internal staff and also external consultants.
		Within our Quality Management Framework we also have a Performance Management System to ensure that all staff have a development plan that is monitored routinely.
		Stewart First Aid Training trainer-assessors complete a training and mentoring programme on joining our business. This ensures standardisation of our workplace training products. In the first year each trainer-assessor will be monitored at least quarterly to ensure that they achieve all trainer learning objectives. After this the trainers are formally monitored and skills assessed annually for appraisal.
		Our company uses a team of qualified internal verifiers who work with each trainer-assessor on 4 occasions through the year. They will appraise the training and assessing skills of all trainers. The feedback from this will be reviewed by the Training Manager and External Verifiers from FAIB, SQA and ITC.
Does the designated person have a current FAW certificate or qualify for an exemption?	Yes	Our Training Manager has all necessary credentials to oversee the Quality Assurance Plan including a First Aid at Work credential.
Does the designated person have an assessing / verifying qualification?	Yes	Our Training Manager holds all necessary credentials (A1 & V1) to oversee our Quality Assurance Plan for Training.

The results for these are processed and summarised for the Quality team. The summary reports can be sent to clients for their records and for demonstration of learning.
